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I. PROJECT PROPOSAL

A. Executive Summary

VOCES PR Immunization and Health Promotion Coalition (hereafter referred to as VOCES) proposes a comprehensive project aimed at supporting the Medicaid Program in Puerto Rico to ensure that registered participants can update their records and complete the documentation submission process in a timely manner.

VOCES is a non-profit organization with a strong track record of commitment to public health in Puerto Rico, whose mission is to expand equitable access to healthcare through advocacy, education, and promotion efforts. With over a decade of experience since its founding in 2013, VOCES has demonstrated its ability to develop, lead, and execute initiatives related to the promotion and equitable access to immunization and healthcare in collaboration with various governmental and non-governmental organizations.

Between January 2021 and December 2022, VOCES organized and conducted 11,714 vaccination events and operated 17 vaccination centers in commercial centers throughout the entire island of Puerto Rico, administering 835,566 Covid-19 vaccine doses. Projects like the Vacu-Tour and Telemedicine have shown that **VOCES** possesses a solid set of competencies that support successful interorganizational project execution. These competencies include training personnel, standardizing administrative procedures, and efficiently maximizing resources. The organization is also distinguished by its capacity to 1) develop high-quality content in various formats and efficiently disseminate it to its audience in a timely manner, 2) collaborate with an extensive network of partners and respond rapidly and efficiently to ever-changing needs. The inclusion of communities with diverse functional needs in our programs reflects VOCES commitment to equity and accessibility.

The project in support of the Medicaid Program will focus on community education and awareness, facilitating access through guidance and support centers in convenient

locations with extended hours, and on-site personalized assistance to guide eligible participants through the recertification process and the use of the digital platform.

VOCES will develop a digital participant activation campaign to educate and summon the eligible Medicaid population. Furthermore, we will utilize all available digital platforms in collaboration with the Puerto Rico Department of Health and allied organizations to disseminate the call to action and provide relevant information. The goal is to reach an audience of one million people through various digital platforms such as Facebook, Youtube, Instagram, Twitter, and Google Search. Metrics will include the number of impressions, reach, user engagement, and participation.

To provide convenient access and scheduling flexibility, **VOCES** will establish information and technical assistance centers in strategically located commercial centers, including a permanent center in Plaza Las Américas. Additionally, we will conduct activities in communities and municipalities in collaboration with community leaders, mayors, and civic groups to reach populations with special needs or limited access to healthcare services and/or transportation. These centers and activities will have specialized staff to provide guidance on requirements and the recertification process and to provide technical assistance to beneficiaries and potential participants in completing their application process through the digital platform. Special attention will be given to populations with special needs. Orientation and technical assistance centers and activities are expected to impact 50,000 participants and eligible candidates for the Medicaid program. Metrics will include daily digital registration of participants, the number of individuals oriented about the process, and the quantity of participants successfully completing the application process.

The monitoring and evaluation plan will ensure constant measurement of project progress, with weekly progress reports to be sent on Fridays, after closing of previous week on Saturdays. Quantitative and qualitative indicators will be used to assess the effectiveness of the implemented strategies, and satisfaction surveys will be administered to gather participant feedback.

B. Organization Information:

Voces Coalición de Inmunización y Promoción de la Salud, Inc. (Hereafter referred to as VOCES)

1. Purpose, Mission, and Vision:

VOCES is a nonprofit organization with 501(c)(3) status, based on the community, with over 100 participating organizations, including healthcare professional associations, government entities, research and educational institutions, grassroots community organizations, academia, the private sector, and other nonprofit entities.

Our mission is to enhance equitable access to healthcare through advocacy, education, and promotion efforts rooted in the values of the common good, equity, commitment, responsibility, integrity, and ethics.

Our vision is a Puerto Rico with a healthy population having equitable access to healthcare and free from preventable diseases through education and early intervention.

2. Description of relevant qualifications and experience:

Since its inception in 2013, VOCES has had a significant impact on education and immunization promotion through various initiatives, educational campaigns, and national events in collaboration with professional associations, the Department of Health, and other public and private entities. These comprehensive awareness efforts have resulted in keeping immunization-related topics relevant and updated, the approval of public policy, improved coverage, and innovative regulations that have brought Puerto Rico closer to ensuring adequate vaccine access for a broad segment of the population.

Throughout a history of successes, several educational campaigns have been developed, led, and implemented to raise awareness about vaccine-preventable

infectious diseases, the importance of immunization, and recommendations from the CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices and the Puerto Rico Department of Health for vulnerable populations and those at higher risk of developing diseases. We have also coordinated and provided continuous education on prevention and immunization, public health emergency management, natural disasters, hepatitis C, and telemedicine to doctors, nurses, pharmacists, media, and community leaders through the Annual Immunization Congress (IMCO) held annually. Additionally, we offer virtual courses for healthcare professionals and communities. To date, we have impacted over 13,400 healthcare professionals.

For the past 10 years **VOCES** has utilized the knowledge and experience gained in community outreach and participation programs, focused on prevention including education, planning, logistics, administration, and execution of annual mass vaccination campaigns against influenza and other vaccine-preventable diseases. We have also mobilized over 100 community, civil, and civic groups to provide access to vaccination during times of emergencies caused by natural disasters, seismic movements in the southwest, and the current COVID-19 pandemic. This demonstrates our effectiveness, leadership, and prudent resource management.

During late 2017 and 2018, post-Hurricanes Irma and Maria, **VOCES** managed to convene volunteers, secure vaccine donations, develop plans, and impact communities, becoming the primary provider for influenza, tetanus, and pneumonia vaccinations, reaching over 88,000 individuals in more than 600 vulnerable communities. Additionally, a program for vector control and leptospirosis infections was developed, distributing over 1,800 water filters to households, more than 10,000 mosquito repellents, and \$200,000 worth of food, water, and essential items in communities. This showcases our leadership and mobilization capabilities, activating allies and collaborators to mitigate the health crisis.

In early 2020, in response to multiple earthquakes in the southwest area of the island, **VOCES** relocated its mobile unit to state-run shelters and improvised ones

in 16 municipalities, in collaboration with community leaders, administering over 35,000 vaccine doses, distributing water filters, personal hygiene products, and providing education to citizens.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the **VOCES** Virtual initiative was developed. It included interviews with health authorities aimed at providing reliable and pertinent health information to communities, with a focus on parents, caregivers, and educators of Head Start and childcare center children, small business owners, and other enterprises, as well as older adults and caregivers in long-term care facilities. The **VOCES** team developed material and content to educate the public about prevention measures and how to handle changes in information updates. Our website received over 50,000 visits. Additionally, the following programs and initiatives were conducted:

- First media campaign against COVID-19 "Stay Home, We Are All Responsible for Stopping This Virus" in collaboration with 22 healthcare professional groups.
- Educational initiative "We Are Well in Community Health" A virtual training program for community leaders on how to develop initiatives to promote health in their communities.
- "Patients First Alliance," in collaboration with the Puerto Rican Diabetes Association, the Puerto Rican Lung Association, the Puerto Rican Renal Council, the American Cancer Society of P.R., the Alliance for the Control of Chronic Diseases, the Comprehensive Cancer Center of PR, and AARP, aimed at ensuring that patients with chronic diseases did not interrupt their healthcare and maintained their quality of life amid the pandemic. This alliance gave rise to TelesaludPuertoRico.com to educate patients about telemedicine and how to integrate into this new modality.

Once the COVID-19 vaccine became available in Puerto Rico, VOCES sought to activate the coalition model, joining efforts with multiple allied entities and the

Puerto Rico Department of Health in a unified exercise to vaccinate as many patients as possible. The first action to support the Department of Health's Vaccination Program was to facilitate the call and access to training for thousands of healthcare professionals to become certified in the proper handling of the COVID-19 vaccine. We developed and trained organizational, civil, and civic leaders on tasks necessary in the logistics process, orientation, document completion, and vaccination. This prepared a volunteer force and facilitated close collaboration with the civilian community.

The initial vaccination activities, targeting first responders, healthcare professionals, and older adults, were well-received due to the service's necessity. In January 2021, with the support of the municipality of Guaynabo, who provided the Yolanda Guerrero Cultural Center, VOCES opened the first permanent vaccination center, providing vaccination services to older adults. Over time, vaccination eligibility expanded to include individuals of various ages and conditions. We educated and vaccinated more than 1,000 to 1,200 individuals daily with extended hours, seven days a week.

However, undoubtedly, the COVID-19 VacuTour was the most extensive and ambitious project. In February 2021, the Puerto Rico Department of Health (PRDoH) requested proposals from different groups and entities to be part of the department's interventions in response to the emergency caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. VOCES was invited to participate in this process and present the ability to replicate what we have been doing for many years. In March, the organization received notification that its proposal had been accepted. Initially funded by the Cares Act and later by FEMA funds allocated to accelerate vaccination, the proposal was directed towards three specific areas: (1) providing vaccination services through diverse strategies and activities, (2) providing educational services aimed at increasing vaccine confidence, and (3) conducting individual interventions to remove barriers related to social determinants that impact some

individuals, especially the most vulnerable, from receiving vaccination services according to established recommendations.

For two years, over 11,000 vaccination events were held throughout the island, reaching vulnerable populations and communities. VOCES managed to administer over 850,000 vaccine doses, exceeding the program's expectations of 700,000 doses. We stood out for overall organization, quality of service to the public, and our ability to mobilize communities. One of the key strategies for the success of this project was the establishment of 17 permanent vaccination centers in strategic locations around the island, where approximately 56% of the doses were administered. This demonstrated that developing permanent centers is a cost-effective and high-yield strategy. It is essential to emphasize that during this time, 19 educational and activation campaigns were developed to educate the public about preventive measures, new vaccines, and changes in recommendations.

The most recent project was in support of the Puerto Rico Comprehensive Cancer Center and its participant recruitment program for the All of Us study at the "Healthy Communities" and VOCES vaccination center located at Plaza Las Américas. In an eight-week period, we managed to recruit over 350 participants and more than 1,800 candidates for registration. The strength of this project lay in individual interviews, completing participant information processes, and uploading data to digital platforms. This demonstrates the ability of VOCES to engage with the general public, provide orientation about processes, and guide individuals to complete information in digital platforms.

3. Evidence of organizational capacity:

a. Leadership

Chief Executive Officer and Founder: Mrs. Lilliam Rodríguez Capó Lilliam Rodríguez is a prominent activist in health and prevention with over 30 years of experience in event planning and strategic planning. She has worked in the

private sector as well as with non-profit organizations focused on training professionals and developing programs for patient organizations. Since 2013, she has led VOCES alongside an extraordinary team. In 2022, Ana G. Méndez University awarded her an honorary doctorate in Health for her excellent leadership in successfully coordinating vaccination efforts and public guidance during the pandemic. She is a passionate advocate for public health and has worked tirelessly to improve access to healthcare and the well-being of people in Puerto Rico.

Medical Director: Dr. Ana Rodríguez Acevedo

Dr. Ana Rodríguez Acevedo is a pediatric specialist with over 30 years of experience. She completed her bachelor's degree at the University of Puerto Rico, Mayagüez Campus, and her Doctor of Medicine degree at the Central East University School of Medicine in the Dominican Republic. She then completed her Pediatric Residency at the Ramón Ruiz Arnau Hospital of the Central Caribbean University in Bayamón, Puerto Rico. She also served as the Medical Director of the COVID-19 proposal in collaboration with the Department of Health.

Board of Directors

To carry out its work and achieve its goals, VOCES has a Board of Directors composed of recognized professionals from various disciplines and experiences in the healthcare field, who volunteer their time and expertise for the Coalition's strategic planning and operation. Below is a description of the experience and background of the Board members.

President: Lcdo. Ricardo Torres Muñoz

Lodo. Torres has worked in the Public Health field for over 25 years. He served as the Secretary of Family Health in the Puerto Rico Department of Health from

2013-2016. As Deputy Secretary and Senior Deputy Officer, he was responsible for overseeing programs related to Immunization, Maternal-Infant Health, HIV/STDs/TB, intellectual disabilities, children with special needs and intellectual disabilities. For a year and a half, he worked closely with the CDC regarding the Zika epidemic in Puerto Rico, specifically access to contraceptives. He earned his master's degree in International Health Management, Economics, and Policy from Bocconi University. He has been a member of the VOCES PR Board of Directors for the past 5 years.

Vice President: Engineer Iván Lugo

Engineer Iván Lugo Montes is the Executive Director of the Puerto Rico Industry University Research Center (INDUNIV), a non-profit organization that promotes Puerto Rico's competitiveness in science and technology by facilitating collaboration between industry, government, and academia. He has over 40 years of experience in the local and global pharmaceutical industry. He has been a member of the VOCES Board of Directors for the past 10 years.

Treasurer: Dr. Concepción Quiñones de Longo

Dr. Concepción Quiñones de Longo is a Puerto Rican pediatrician and public servant. She served as the interim Secretary of Health of Puerto Rico in March 2020 and previously served as Deputy Secretary of the Department of Health from 2008-2012. During her career, she worked as a pediatric instructor at the University of Puerto Rico and was a member of the University Pediatric Hospital for 36 years. In the 1980s, she helped the Puerto Rico Department of Health establish pediatric centers for children with special needs and hospital accreditation. She has been a member of the VOCES Board of Directors and held various positions over the past 10 years.

Secretary: Dr. Elba Díaz Toro

Dr. Elba Díaz Toro is a dental healthcare professional specialized in areas such as prosthodontics, oncologic dentistry, and tobacco prevention, among other health branches. She currently serves as a professor and director of the Department of Restorative Sciences at the Dental Medicine School of the University of Puerto Rico (EMD-UPR). She is also a member of the government task force for the COVID-19 pandemic. She has been a member of the VOCES Board of Directors for the past 10 years in various positions.

Board Members:

Lcda. Eileen Ortega

Eileen Ortega is the Director of Operations for Walgreens Co. in Puerto Rico, a national pharmacy chain based in Deerfield, Illinois. She is responsible for overseeing Walgreens' store and pharmacy operations in Puerto Rico at 104 locations, representing 5,000 team members in Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Eileen is a pharmacist by profession, a graduate of the Faculty of Pharmacy at the University of Puerto Rico Medical Sciences Campus. She currently serves as the President of the Puerto Rico Board of Pharmacy, a member of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy, and a member of the Advisory Committee of the Controlled Substances Monitoring Program of the Puerto Rico Department of Health. She actively participates in several non-profit organizations, including the Puerto Rican Heart Association, local HIV organizations, the Diabetes Association of Puerto Rico, Susan G. Komen, the Leukemia and Lymphoma Chapter of Puerto Rico, and has been an active member of the VOCES Puerto Rico board since its inception.

Lcda. Idalia Bonilla

Lcda. Idalia Bonilla is a Puerto Rican pharmacist who has dedicated 40 years of her life serving public health. She currently serves as the President of the College of Pharmacists of Puerto Rico. Lcda. Bonilla has achieved numerous accomplishments throughout her distinguished career and is recognized for her commitment to the pharmacy profession and the community. She also served as the President of the Community Pharmacy Association.

Dr. Yasmin Pedrogo

Dr. Yasmin Pedrogo is a pediatric specialist in Puerto Rico. She is currently based in San Juan and serves as the Director of the Clinical Skills Center. She has also served as the President of the Puerto Rico Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics. Throughout her career of over 20 years, her voice has been a powerful advocate for early vaccination and early childhood care. Dr. Yasmin Pedrogo graduated from the University of Puerto Rico School of Medicine in 2005 and is certified by the American Board of Pediatrics in pediatrics and pediatric hospital medicine. She currently works at the University Pediatric Hospital in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Former Senator Lucy Arce

Lucy Arce worked as a teacher with the Head Start Program and as an Ombudsman for the Aguadilla region. She also worked as Regional Director of the Public Housing Administration in Aguadilla and later as Regional Manager of the Commonwealth Employees Association (AEELA) in Arecibo. In 1993, Arce was appointed Assistant Administrator of the Retirement System for Government Employees of Puerto Rico. She also served as Commissioner of the Women's Affairs Commission. In 1996, Arce was elected Senator by Accumulation. During her time in the Senate of Puerto Rico, she served as Vice President of the Senate, Alternate Chief Spokesperson, President of the Legislative Assembly of

Women, and Chairwoman of the Labor, Veterans Affairs, and Human Resources Committees.

The Communications Director plays a strategic role in managing internal and

external communication for the project. Their primary objective is to establish and

maintain an effective communication strategy that promotes the reputation and

image of the proposed activities, as well as conveying key messages to the

media, clients, and other external stakeholders.

Digital Campaign Coordinator

They will be responsible for developing the digital campaign, coordinating with

the creative department and managing the digital platforms and social media

channels to promote the information centers, events, activities, and calendars.

IT Coordinator

They will be responsible for supervising the IT infrastructure and systems,

ensuring information security, and providing technical support to ensure the

proper functioning and use of technology in information management.

Legal Compliance

The Compliance Director is responsible for ensuring that the organization

complies with all state and federal laws, regulations, and internal and external

policies. Their primary objective is to prevent and detect non-compliance and

violations and take the necessary measures to correct and prevent their

recurrence.

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4. INTRODUCTION AND SCOPE OF WORK

Introduction

The Medicaid Program in Puerto Rico has played a crucial role in providing access to healthcare for thousands of island residents. Currently, the enrollment of participants in the Medicaid program in PR encompasses an approximate total of 1.6 million lives, including 1.289 million participants between the ages of 1-64, 304,000 participants aged 65 or older (Platinum), and participants under the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

Over the past six years, Puerto Rico has faced a series of unprecedented challenges due to multiple states of emergency that have affected the island. As a result of these critical situations, the federal government exempted Puerto Rico from the annual recertification process in the Medicaid Program during this period. However, in 2023, the Federal Government has required the Government of Puerto Rico to recertify all Medicaid program beneficiaries on or before March 31, 2024.

COVID-19:

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented a series of significant challenges for the Medicaid program in the United States and its territories, including Puerto Rico. Some of the challenges that Medicaid has faced because of the pandemic include:

 Increase in Enrollment: The pandemic led to a massive loss of jobs and, consequently, an increase in Medicaid enrollment as people lost their employer-provided health insurance, placing additional pressure on Medicaid budgets in many states and territories, including Puerto Rico.

- 2. **Strain on Healthcare Resources**: The demand for healthcare services increased dramatically during the pandemic, especially in significantly affected areas.
- 3. *Telemedicine*: The pandemic made telemedicine essential to ensure that Medicaid beneficiaries could access healthcare safely.
- 4. **Care for Vulnerable Populations**: The pandemic disproportionately affected certain populations, such as the elderly and people with disabilities.

On the other hand, the COVID-19 pandemic emphasized the importance of access to healthcare, making the recertification of Medicaid program participants in Puerto Rico a crucial process to ensure that those who qualify continue to receive the necessary assistance.

Challenges in Medicaid Recertification in Puerto Rico:

The recertification process in programs like Medicaid can pose several challenges. These challenges may vary depending on the jurisdiction and specific circumstances, but some common hurdles in the recertification process include:

- Document Complexity: Applicants often require the submission of a series of documents to prove their eligibility. Gathering and presenting this documentation can be complicated for some individuals, especially if they do not have easy access to the required medical, financial, or identification records.
- Access Barriers: Some eligible individuals may face obstacles in accessing the
 recertification process due to lack of transportation, health or disability issues,
 language barriers, or geographic location. These obstacles can make it difficult
 for people to attend recertification appointments.

- Unawareness of Deadlines: Beneficiaries must adhere to specific deadlines for submitting their recertification. Lack of awareness of these deadlines can lead to coverage loss if recertification is not completed on time.
- Changes in Eligibility: Personal and financial circumstances can change over time, and some individuals may not be aware that they are now eligible for Medicaid due to changes in their situations. On the other hand, some beneficiaries may have lost their eligibility but still attempt to recertify.
- Lack of Awareness of Benefits: Some individuals may not be aware of the benefits of Medicaid or may underestimate its importance, which can decrease their motivation to complete the recertification process.
- Communication Issues: Communication between beneficiaries, social workers, and government agencies can be complicated. Communication errors, misinformation, or inadequate follow-up can lead to delays or issues in the recertification process.
- Changes in Employment Status: For beneficiaries who gain employment, increases in the minimum wage or changes in income can affect their eligibility. Understanding how these changes can influence recertification can be confusing and cause fear of losing benefits.
- Technological Problems: In some places, recertification can be done online, which can be a problem for individuals with limited internet access or limited technological skills.
- Limited Resources: Medicaid agencies may have limited resources to carry out the recertification process, which can result in delays or a lack of staff to assist beneficiaries facing difficulties.
- Change of Address or Contact: If beneficiaries change their address or phone number without notifying Medicaid agencies, it can hinder communication and recertification.

In response to these challenges, Medicaid has taken steps to adapt and streamline the recertification process. These include using online or phone recertification methods,

relaxing documentation requirements, and providing resources and assistance to help participants complete the process safely and efficiently during the pandemic. These challenges highlight the importance of addressing barriers and facilitating the recertification process for Medicaid participants.

Scope of Work

With the goal of supporting the Medicaid Program in Puerto Rico to ensure that registered participants in the Medicaid program can update their records and complete the documentation process on time, **VOCES** proposes to address possible barriers and facilitating the process by:

- Developing and implementing effective strategies to streamline the recertification of beneficiaries and ensure that those who are eligible continue to receive the necessary services.
- 2. Activating the coalition model for the integration of patient organizations, civil groups, volunteers from various organizations such as the Lions Club of PR, the Rotary Club of PR, AARP, and private companies willing to collaborate in spreading the message, activating participants, and providing cost-free locations to establish orientation and assistance centers.
- 3. Utilizing all digital platforms to disseminate the call, in collaboration with the Department of Health and with the support of allied organizations and collaborators.

Proposed Strategies for the Medicaid Recertification and Recruitment Program

1. Education and Awareness:

Develop and implement a digital information campaign targeting the public, in collaboration with the Department of Health and with the support of professional associations, civil groups, and community leaders, to:

- a. Increase awareness of the benefits of Medicaid, eligibility criteria, recertification deadlines, and required documents to complete the process.
- b. Promote and mobilize participants to our permanent centers and community activities.
- c. Provide clear and accessible informational material in both English and Spanish, ensuring it is available online.
- d. the use of translators and sign language at fixed centers and community activities to serve the deaf population.

2. Access Facilitation:

- Establish guidance and technical assistance centers in extended and accessible locations and hours for the target population.
- b. Conduct activities in communities and municipalities to reach populations with special needs and/or limited access to transportation services, in collaboration with community leaders, mayors, religious leaders, and civil leaders.

3. On-Site Assistance:

- a. Offer in-person support through orientation and assistance centers and/or community events.
- b. Provide trained personnel to answer questions and guide beneficiaries through the process, offering guidance on eligibility requirements, required documents, and the recertification process.
- c. Provide technical assistance in the use of the Vital digital platform to ensure that participants have access to their accounts, update their data in the Medicaid system, and submit the required documents to successfully complete the application process. However, the Medicaid

- team would be responsible for the evaluation and approval of each participant.
- d. Provide a secure location where participants can deposit their document packages if they are complete.

For the purposes of this proposal, we will be reaching out to the entire eligible population that meets the requirements set forth by the Department of Health, some of which may be uninsured.

The program pursues three important aspects: 1) providing education about the benefits, eligibility requirements, and the process of completing the application for recertification, 2) assisting the participant in completing the necessary steps to submit their application, and 3) facilitating access points to provide extended hours and greater convenience and eliminate current barriers in the use of digital platforms.

Proposed Activities for the Medicaid Recruitment Program:

1. Information and Technical Assistance Centers - Establish six (6) information, education, and technical assistance centers for the Medicaid program in strategically located commercial centers around the island, based on areas of greatest need. This strategy was tested by our organization for the COVID-19 Vacu Tour project and proved highly effective in maintaining fixed centers with extended hours in locations that provide access and convenience to the public.

Based on this experience, we propose to open a permanent center at Plaza Las Américas, serving one of the most densely populated areas, for a period of 26 weeks. The remaining five centers will be open for five (5) weeks each, rotating throughout the island based on priorities and strategically covering the main geographical regions.

These centers will have the following staff:

- a. *Planning and Logistics Coordinator* Responsible for coordinating with shopping center management, agencies, and other stakeholders regarding the planning and logistics of fixed orientation and assistance centers in commercial centers. They will handle all necessary arrangements and procedures for each event, including insurance endorsements, permits, setup, and teardown, etc.
- b. *Center Supervisor* This individual will be responsible for supervising the staff, achieving the goals set for each center, and managing daily reports on attendance and program compliance. Additionally, they will be designated to maintain communication with VOCES IT (Information Technology) coordinator for technical matters with the Department of Health and Medicaid, to troubleshoot and manage any technical issues that may arise.
- c. *Information and Technical Assistance Personnel* This staff will play a crucial role in providing information and support to beneficiaries and potential participants. They will be trained to guide individuals through the application process, provide guidance on available services and requirements, and answer questions. They can also assist individuals in completing application forms on the digital platform and collecting the necessary documentation.
- d. **Ushers** This staff will help direct participants to the appropriate area within the center based on their needs.

Each center will have a center supervisor and between four to six (4-6) trained technicians for orientation and technical assistance, allowing us to serve a significant group of participants simultaneously. In collaboration with the Puerto Rican Association of Commerciales Centers, the centers will operate from

Monday to Saturday from 9:00 am to 7:00 pm, on a five-week rotation at each shopping center. There will be one permanent center at Plaza Las Américas for 26 weeks, with extended hours from 9:00 am to 9:00 pm. These centers will have signage identifying the areas and types of assistance available.

This extended schedule will allow participants the flexibility to visit these centers outside of working or academic hours, to seek orientations, complete the recertification process, and/or submit documentation. The centers will have an information area, a waiting area, a technical assistance area, and a drop-off box for completed applications. They will also have a structured logistics system based on arrival times, access for disabled individuals, pregnant women, and assistance for the deaf with sign language interpreters through the use of telemedicine.

- 2. Community and/or Municipal Activities Develop 40 community activities in collaboration with community leaders, municipalities, civic groups, and other organizations, both in the public and private sectors, to reach all Medicaid participant groups and those with limited access, such as people with disabilities, people with intellectual disabilities, the deaf community, and blind individuals, in those municipalities with the highest "NO SHOW" rates. These events will last for one day each, with a duration of 6-7 hours, and will have the following staff:
 - a. *Planning and Logistics Coordinator* Responsible for coordinating all aspects of community event planning and logistics. They will handle all necessary arrangements and procedures for each event, including insurance, permits, setup, and teardown, etc.
 - b. **Event Supervisor** This individual will be responsible for supervising the staff, achieving the goals set for each activity, and managing daily reports on attendance and program compliance. Additionally, they will be designated to maintain communication with VOCES PR's IT (Information

Technology) Program for technical matters with the Department of Health and Medicaid, to troubleshoot and manage any technical issues that may arise.

- c. Information and Technical Assistance Personnel This staff will play a crucial role in providing information and support to beneficiaries and potential participants. They will be trained to guide individuals through the application process, provide guidance on available services and requirements, and answer questions. They can also assist individuals in completing application forms on the digital platform and collecting the necessary documentation.
- d. **Ushers** This staff will help direct participants to the appropriate area within the event based on their needs.
- e. **Volunteers** Through strategic partnerships with civic entities, we will have volunteer staff to support various areas.
- 3. Digital and Public Service Activation Campaign Develop an activation and education campaign targeting Medicaid participants and eligible populations, to be implemented from October 2023 to March 2024, to promote the project's access points, the organization's commitment to collaborate and be part of this Medicaid Recruitment program, and to provide guidance on eligibility criteria and the required documents to start the process.

This campaign will be implemented on digital platforms, social media, and other media channels to educate and engage the population, placing ads through (META), YouTube, publications, and an informative microsite. We will use the **VOCES** database and the support of stakeholders and allies, such as patient organizations and civil groups, to help us spread the message and achieve a greater impact.

The campaign will include:

- a. Director of Communications Plays a strategic role in managing internal and external project communication. Their main objective is to establish and maintain an effective communication strategy that promotes the reputation and image of the proposed activities and conveys key messages to the media, clients, and other external interest groups.
- **b.** Digital Campaign Coordinator Will coordinate promotions with the creative department and be responsible for managing digital platforms and social media to promote information centers, events, and activities, as well as schedules. They will be responsible for the digital campaign being developed.
- c. Creative Team Responsible for developing the creative concept and adapting pieces for different platforms. VOCES will collaborate with the communication staff designated by Medicaid in the development of the creative concept and in identifying material approved by the Department of Health for dissemination to the community.
- d. Public Relations Specialist As it is a collaborative campaign between VOCES and the Medicaid program, this individual will be responsible for seeking free promotion opportunities, requesting collaboration from entities, mass media, universities, and other allies of our organization.
- 4. Personnel and Volunteer Training Center. Our main center at Plaza Las Américas will also serve as a training center where staff and volunteers from various organizations can undergo training to perform their roles.
- 5. **Evaluation and Participant Survey VOCES** will develop a brief questionnaire to collect data on social determinants in the population of potential Medicaid candidates and/or eligible individuals who use the provided services.

Project Duration:

Upon award of the contract, there will be approximately two (2) weeks of planning, twenty-four (24) weeks for the execution of activities, and one (1) week for completing the financial and programmatic reports, for a total of 27 weeks. (This may vary depending on contract approval and signing).

Objectives and Performance Indicators

1. Digital Patient Activation Campaign: Through the combined use of various digital platforms such as Facebook, YouTube, Instagram, Twitter, Google Search, among others, and e-blasts, we expect to reach an audience of one million people. The metrics to be used will include: 1) the number of impressions, 2) reach, 3) user interaction and engagement with the campaign.

We will monitor these metrics globally and individually for each medium and platform to assess the effectiveness of the campaign in real-time and make the necessary adjustments to ensure proper targeting of the target population while maximizing the investment.

- 2. Orientation and Technical Assistance Centers and Activities: With this project, we hope to impact a total of 50,000 participants and/or eligible candidates for the Medicaid program. We will use the following metrics to evaluate the progress of objectives and identify challenges and areas of opportunity in the process in a timely manner:
 - Daily digital registration of participants who visit the centers and/or attend community events and activities.
 - The number of participants who receive guidance on the process.

- The number of participants who can successfully complete the application process.
- The number of participants who deposit their completed documents and forms in the drop-off boxes.
- A satisfaction survey.

Monitoring and Evaluation Plan:

VOCES will develop tools to measure the effectiveness of each initiative and will deliver a weekly progress report to be sent on Fridays, after closing of previous week on Saturdays. The content and format will be determined in collaboration with the Medicaid program team.

Monitoring the achievement indicators and evaluating the results of the strategies to be implemented will also be considered in this project. Quantitative and qualitative indicators have been identified to monitor the project's progress and compliance with its overall goal and objectives. For this purpose, data collection instruments will be designed, and participant satisfaction surveys will be administered. All information will be kept in a single database to facilitate analysis, comparisons, contrasts, and trends. Due to the short duration of the project, evaluation activities should begin from the start, resulting in both process and outcome evaluation. Monitoring and data collection will allow for necessary adjustments and modifications along the way to ensure goal attainment.

Quantitative compliance indicators may include established metrics to measure the effectiveness of the media used in the participant activation campaign, daily registration of participants at each fixed center and/or community activity, total participants receiving guidance on eligibility requirements and the recertification process, total participants successfully completing their application process.

Qualitative compliance indicators may include participant satisfaction with the organization of fixed centers and/or community activities, service quality, the orientation and technical assistance process, available equipment and technology, and the use of the digital platform to complete their application process.

At the end of the project, a final evaluation of impact and results will be carried out, using the information collected and the objectives initially established.

B. Description Of Similar Projects

Telemedicine Project

VOCES leads the Alliance of Patients First (as an administrator and service provider), which consists of the joint efforts of six other organizations: the Renal Council of Puerto Rico, the Puerto Rican Diabetes Association, the Puerto Rican Lung Association, the American Cancer Society Puerto Rico Chapter, AARP Puerto Rico, and the Alliance for Chronic Disease Control of Puerto Rico. Each of these organizations is a leader in its respective field, with a combined track record of over 240 years of collective experience in serving patients with chronic diseases in Puerto Rico.

The mission of this collaborative effort is to ensure access to medical care, educate patients and their families, promote health, encourage the proper use of healthcare services, and be responsive during the COVID-19 emergency. The driving force behind all these efforts was the need to ensure that patients with chronic diseases did not interrupt their healthcare and could maintain their quality of life amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Patients First Alliance requested support from the Department of Health through the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF), which was created under Section 601(a) of the Social Security Act, as added by Section 5001 of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act). The goal was to enhance their patient service capacity and technological capabilities to incorporate various telehealth and telemedicine modalities. These capabilities facilitate community outreach and patient engagement, with the aim of empowering patients to play a more active role in their healthcare to achieve better outcomes and more personalized care.

Promoting and facilitating patient participation in their own healthcare involves patients being involved in decision-making about their medical care, being informed about their condition and treatment, and committing to following medical recommendations. To achieve this, the Patients First Alliance proposed to consolidate efforts focused on strengthening three main areas:

- 1. Patient Education: This involved developing and creating informative content that was disseminated through various channels such as calls, chats, email blasts, vlogs, educational materials, websites, television and radio ads, in-person community activities, webinars, and interviews with trusted healthcare professionals. The content covered topics related to access to healthcare services provided by doctors and other professionals to ensure continuity of care and treatment adherence.
- 2. Data Management and Technological Infrastructure: The project provided infrastructure through technological equipment, platforms, and training for their use. It also involved creating a database where patient information was collected and managed. This facilitated documentation of access to services and patient follow-up, as well as data analysis to measure transitions and outcomes in chronic disease care.
- 3. High-Impact Media Education Campaign: This campaign aimed to inform patients with chronic diseases, their families, caregivers, and healthcare professionals about telehealth and telemedicine. It leveraged both digital and traditional media to mobilize the public to access educational content.

Results and Achievements: The project successfully met all its objectives during the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic in Puerto Rico between November 2020 and June 2021. In addition, it equipped the partner organizations with the infrastructure and protocols to embrace technology and processes related to telehealth and telemedicine. The campaign exceeded its estimated reach and social media utilization goals, accumulating a total reach of 8,980,074 visits and 50,476 users

engaged in the educational campaign. The project also surpassed its goal for direct service, reaching 35,897 individuals and 32,478 people in group services.

The Telehealth Puerto Rico project aimed to provide accurate information to educate both service providers and patients about the use of technology to facilitate communication between patients with special needs and their providers during the COVID-19 pandemic. Once again, the successful use of the coalition model allowed for resource maximization, community outreach, and media impact, directly benefiting vulnerable populations in a timely manner.

The overall goal of the project was to educate about the telehealth modality and implement it as a strategy to ensure uninterrupted access to healthcare services, with special attention to the COVID-19 emergency to limit exposure of patients with chronic diseases to the virus. To achieve this, the project was planned around five tangible purposes or objectives:

- Access to Technological Equipment: Creating the necessary conditions for patient-focused organizations within the Patients First Alliance to educate, promote, and use telehealth modalities for health education, prevention, direct service, and advocacy.
 - The project provided organizations with the necessary technology and equipment to offer telehealth services.
 - Training was conducted for the staff, professionals, and volunteers of the partner organizations to strengthen the skills required for effective use of telehealth.
 - Technological and information management capabilities were strengthened, as were programmatic and fiscal processes within the organizations, contributing to a successful project implementation.

- 2. Standardization of Educational Resources and Documentation Processes: Facilitating a common system for collecting, organizing, classifying, and analyzing information about services provided to patients with chronic diseases. This was accomplished through the provision of technological infrastructure and knowledge to partner organizations, enabling them to make informed decisions based on quality information.
 - Educational content was developed for various media formats, and a website was created to provide information on telemedicine in the context of patients and their diseases.
 - Platforms like WizeHive, JotForm, and Salesforce were implemented to effectively collect, organize, classify, and analyze information. This standardization allowed for data analysis, information privacy, and informed decision-making.
 - Over 800 tablets were provided to long-term care institutions for educational and demonstrative use, as well as to facilitate virtual connections with healthcare professionals.
 - Technical support was provided to the organizations within the Patients
 First Alliance, including a total of 124 meetings with each organization's
 work teams. This contributed to the development of a data culture and
 strengthened information management capabilities.
- 3. **Empowerment of Patients:** Preparing patients from partner organizations with the technology, equipment, and knowledge needed to manage and maximize the use of Telecare, Telemonitoring, and Teleconsultation modalities.
 - The organization conducted educational video conferences and an educational campaign to train patients and caregivers on the use of secure virtual tools to access telehealth.

- The website telesaludpuertorico.com was created, and educational content was produced in various media to provide valuable information to people living with chronic diseases.
- In-person guidance was provided at COVID-19 vaccination centers established by VOCES, allowing for direct interaction with patients and their families.
- Innovation was achieved by including sign language interpreters who educated the public in videos, webinars, and in-person at vaccination centers.
- 4. **Media Campaign:** Promoting the use of telehealth and telemedicine modalities among the broad population of patients with chronic diseases (approximately 1.2 million people in Puerto Rico), their families, and caregivers.
 - An educational campaign was conducted on social media, reaching a large number of people (2,997,277) to introduce the concepts of telehealth and telemedicine.
 - Social media reach was maximized because each organization allied with Patients First adopted the same campaign with the same resources, disseminating and replicating it on all their social media accounts (Facebook, Instagram, YouTube, etc.).
 - The Alliance participated in radio and television interviews on major Puerto Rican stations and channels to further disseminate information about telehealth and telemedicine.
- 5. Collaboration with Other Entities in the Efforts of the Telemedicine Program of Puerto Rico:
 - Collaborations were formalized with various entities, including the Science and Technology Trust of Puerto Rico, the Renal Nutrition Council of Puerto

- Rico, the Renal Social Work Council of Puerto Rico, Albizu University, among others.
- The organization collaborated with ASES (Health Insurance Administration of Puerto Rico) to advocate for parity and facilitate the use of telemedicine.

The execution of this project showcased the competencies of the VOCES team in:

- Managing inter-organizational projects using best practices for staff training, standardization of administrative procedures, and resource maximization.
- Combining multiple services in permanent or temporary community centers.
- Integrating populations with special needs into the services provided.
- Developing content for various formats in a timely manner and efficiently disseminating it.
- Convening spokespersons recognized and trusted by the public.
- Adapting to cutting-edge technologies in service delivery.
- Reaching communities through in-person implementations of best practices.

Covid-19 Project

"VOCES from VacuTOUR COVID-19: A Success Story in the Midst of the Pmic, Empowering Communities Through Education and Immunization to Protect Puerto Rico"

The project started in January 2021 and was extended to December 2022.

In January 2021, the Department of Health of Puerto Rico (DSPR) reached out to VOCES to collaborate in the administration of COVID-19 vaccines, based on their extensive experience in logistics and the implementation of vaccination events as a non-traditional provider over the last decade. VOCES enthusiastically accepted the challenge and committed to supporting the endeavor to contribute to public health

protection through vaccination. This led to the creation and opening of the first fixed vaccination center at the Yolanda Guerrero Cultural Center, with the support of the municipality of Guaynabo. From that moment on, the center began to offer vaccination services to older adults on weekdays, with extended hours.

Subsequently, various groups of people by age and medical conditions to be vaccinated were phased in, following the guidelines provided by DSPR. As the groups of people to be vaccinated expanded and the need to reach a large number of individuals in a short period of time became more pressing, operations and initiatives in the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic on the island continued to expand. This gave rise to the DSPR's "VacuTour against COVID-19," which became the largest and most extensive project to educate and immunize residents of Puerto Rico. In February 2021, the Department of Health requested proposals from various groups and entities to participate in DSPR's interventions in response to the emergency stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic and extended an invitation to VOCES to participate in this process.

During the month of March, the organization received notification that their proposal had been accepted. Initially funded under the Cares Act and later through FEMA funds allocated to expedite vaccination, the proposal was directed toward three specific areas: (1) providing vaccination services through diverse strategies and activities, (2) offering educational services aimed at reducing vaccine hesitancy, and (3) conducting individual interventions to remove barriers related to social determinants that affect whether some people, especially the most vulnerable, receive vaccination services in accordance with established recommendations. The goal was to impact immunization efforts with 700,000 doses by conducting a total of 1,100 events between both proposals and recording the data in the Puerto Rico Electronic Immunization Registry (PREIS), as well as managing inventory, complying with all relevant requirements and regulations.

The availability of the vaccine not only offered tangible hope of controlling the disease but also enabled a massive vaccination campaign across the territory. The vaccine became an essential resource to protect citizens and reduce the disease burden on hospitals. In the Vacutour COVID-19 project, VOCES demonstrated its capacity and experience to work on community outreach projects and active patient engagement in the following ways:

Project Results and Demonstrated Competencies:

- 1. Educational and Promotional Campaigns: We conducted 19 education and promotion campaigns on COVID-19, reaching an audience of 2,346,239 people through various communication channels, with an estimated value of over \$3.3 million in public services. These initiatives, in support and collaboration with the Department of Health of Puerto Rico, earned the organization recognition from the general community as a constant reference in promoting accurate and up-to-date information, following the recommendations and guidelines of the CDC and DSPR. The effectiveness of the organization in disseminating essential information on COVID-19, vaccination, and other public health prevention strategies was highlighted.
- Extensive Collaboration Network: VOCES collaborated with over 100 organizations, including healthcare professional associations, government entities, educational institutions, community-based organizations, and other non-profit entities, demonstrating the competence to mobilize resources and work effectively with multiple sectors of interest.
- 3. Rapid and Efficient Mobilization: During the pandemic, our focus was on achieving rapid and efficient mobilization to address the constantly evolving, often urgent, needs of the community. We implemented agile and flexible strategies that allowed us to promptly adapt to emerging challenges, from staff training to vaccine administration. This demonstrated our abilities for rapid and

efficient response in crisis situations, as well as our capacity to stay at the forefront of the fight against the pandemic within short time frames.

- 4. Safe and Effective Handling and Administration of COVID-19 Doses: A total of 835,566 doses of COVID-19 vaccines were administered, showcasing the organization's ability to manage, coordinate, and effectively implement activities aimed at community-wide participation. This ensured the implementation of best practices and maximized resource utilization in large-scale operations. We developed a logistics mobilization process.
- 5. Development of Standardized Protocols: VOCES carried out a successful COVID-19 vaccination campaign characterized by the implementation of rigorous standardized protocols at all stages of the process. Following CDC guidelines, FEMA's Manual for Community Vaccination Centers, and PRDoH guidelines, the organization ensured proper storage and a secure cold chain, established transport and distribution protocols with staff training and constant monitoring, managed inventory in detail, and set up well-equipped vaccination centers with precise protocols. This commitment to quality and safety contributed to the success of the campaign and the well-being of the community.
- 6. Vaccination Events and Activities: A total of 11,714 events and vaccination activities were conducted over a period of 24 months, averaging 20 activities per day, across the island. This highlighted the organization's ability to reach diverse communities and strategic locations, with the commitment to ensuring that no sector of the population was excluded.
- 7. **Coordination** of **Large-Scale Events**: Our organization demonstrated outstanding logistical and strategic planning capabilities by successfully coordinating and executing a massive vaccination event, where 10,000 doses of

COVID-19 vaccines were efficiently and safely administered in a single day. This event took place at the Puerto Rico Convention Center and was the largest vaccination event, showcasing our skills in resource management, inter-institutional collaboration, commitment to public health, and execution capacity, underscoring our firm dedication to contributing to the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic and handling complex, large-scale projects with efficiency and success.

- 8. Impact on Municipalities and Vulnerable Populations: We visited and impacted 78 municipalities, with a primary focus on vulnerable populations. We ensured that the most marginalized and underserved communities had equal access to disease protection, thereby contributing to reducing health disparities and strengthening the resilience of the needlest populations.
- 9. Inclusion of Communities with Functional Diversity: Sign language interpreters were included, who were present both in person and via teleconsultation at vaccination centers and clinics. This allowed individuals with hearing disabilities to have equal access to information and vaccination services, ensuring greater equity in the immunization process.
- 10. Training and Certification Platforms: Training platforms were provided for the Department of Health to certify 13,875 healthcare professionals in the Management and Administration of the COVID-19 vaccine. Additionally, training was created and provided to 1,600 participants in the Vaccination Promoters certification, endorsed by the Department of Health and specifically aimed at school nurses.
- 11. Fixed Training Center. The fixed vaccination center at Plaza Las Américas served as a continuous standardized training center for nursing schools and

personnel involved in all our initiatives, operating seven days a week with extended hours. This evidence-based approach ensured that our staff were adequately prepared and updated to always provide high-quality care to the community.

- 12. Robust Network of Vaccination Centers: A robust network of vaccination centers was established to ensure convenient and effective access to COVID-19 vaccination, with extended hours. In total, 17 fixed vaccination centers were strategically located in shopping centers, offering an accessible and easily reachable environment for the community. The main operational vaccination center was located at Plaza Las Américas, open seven days a week and serving the highest number of patients. Furthermore, to provide comprehensive care to the pediatric population, two pediatric vaccination centers known as "Vacu-Kids" were established, one at Plaza Las Américas and another at Mayagüez Mall. To expand our reach further and reach different communities, 17 temporary vaccination centers were established in collaboration with local municipalities. Together, this diversified network of vaccination centers reflected our commitment to ensuring that the population had timely and convenient access to healthcare services.
- 13. Fixed Call Center and Data Registration: Two key components were implemented to facilitate the vaccination campaign: 1) a Call Center that provided information, scheduled appointments, and used communication strategies such as text messages and automated calls to remind of upcoming doses, as well as WhatsApp Business to streamline telephone support; 2) a Data Center at Plaza Las Américas with over 50 trained individuals responsible for registering data in the PREIS system and ensuring data quality, resulting in a total of 835,566 records. These components, combined, ensured efficient data management and comprehensive community care during the vaccination campaign.

- 14. Compliance with the Department of Health and FEMA: VOCES PR underwent a total of 706 quality control and compliance monitoring checks at vaccination events, as entrusted to the organization by FEMA and the Department of Health over a 17-month period (August 2021 to December 2022), covering various aspects such as operations, protocols, temperature management, staff credentials, and emergency preparedness, thus ensuring operational and fiscal integrity of the project. According to the results shared by DSPR in the operational monitoring of VOCES PR, the organization achieved an average of 91% compliance with the requirements.
- 15. **Work Hours**: A total of 500,000 contracted work hours were recorded by professional and technical personnel. These hours were complemented by over 25,000 volunteer hours, highlighting community participation and the organization's commitment to involving volunteers in its projects, thereby maximizing available resources and increasing the reach of initiatives.

In summary, VOCES PR's Vacutour COVID-19 project demonstrated the organization's capacity to manage large-scale projects, mobilize human and financial resources, and reach diverse communities through a variety of vaccination strategies and educational campaigns. These achievements support its experience and ability to work on future "patient engagement" and large-scale public health projects.

Project Objectives: The project encompassed patient education efforts, delivering informative content through diverse channels such as calls, chats, email blasts, educational materials, and media advertisements. Topics covered access to healthcare services and treatment adherence. It also established robust data management and technological infrastructure, including a patient database, to document service access, follow-up, and data analysis for chronic disease care. Additionally, a high-impact media education campaign was launched to inform patients, caregivers, and healthcare professionals about telehealth and telemedicine, utilizing digital and traditional media for widespread outreach.

Project Description: Between 2020 and 2021 VOCES led the Patients First Alliance, a collaboration involving six prominent nonprofit organizations with over 240 years of collective experience in serving patients with chronic diseases in Puerto Rico. The Alliance was established to ensure healthcare access, patient education, health promotion, and proper healthcare service utilization, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Alliance sought support from the Department of Health's Coronavirus Relief Fund to enhance patient services focusing on technology for telehealth and telemedicine, empowering patients to actively participate in their healthcare for improved outcomes and personalized care. In light of the COVID 19 pandemic, telemedicine was seen as a tool to empower patients and facilitate their decision-making about their medical care, being informed about their condition and treatment, and committing to following medical recommendations.

Vendor's Involvement: In order to empower patient-focused organizations within the Patients First Alliance to effectively utilize telehealth for health education, prevention, direct service, and advocacy, a comprehensive strategy was implemented. This strategy encompassed the development of educational content in various media formats, the creation of the telesaludpuertorico.com website to disseminate telemedicine information, and the utilization of platforms like WizeHive, JotForm, and Salesforce for efficient data collection, organization, and analysis. This standardized approach not only facilitated data analysis and ensured information privacy but also enabled informed decision-making. Additionally, the organization conducted educational video conferences and a social media campaign to educate patients and caregivers on secure virtual tools for telehealth access, further enhancing their telehealth capabilities. In-person guidance at COVID-19 vaccination centers provided direct interaction with patients and families, while a social media educational campaign amplified outreach efforts, collectively strengthening the alliance's telehealth initiatives.

Project Benefits: Digital platforms, including a website and social media profiles, were designed and promoted for an educational campaign on TeleHealth and TeleMedicine, reaching a total of 2,997,277 people on social media. Radio and television interviews were conducted as part of the campaign. Additionally, a total of 97,401 patients were educated, both individually and in groups, with 12,144 individuals benefiting from educational video conferences. To achieve impact in the longer term, 843 computer tablets were delivered to extended care homes to enhance health service delivery, and 157 tablets were

distributed among the allied organizations for continued training and service. Five Telemedicine "kits" were provided to allied entities, and technological infrastructure was enhanced to collect and analyze information. A master collaboration plan was developed among allied entities to meet performance indicators, and work plans and budgets were created for the allied organizations.

Project Description: Be part of the interventions by the Department of Public Safety and Response (DSPR) in emergency response operations related to the COVID-19 pandemic, funded by FEMA, in three specific areas: (1) providing vaccination services through various strategies and activities, (2) offering educational services aimed at reducing vaccine hesitancy, and (3) conducting individual interventions to address social determinants of health that impact certain individuals, especially the most vulnerable, in receiving vaccination services in accordance with established recommendations.

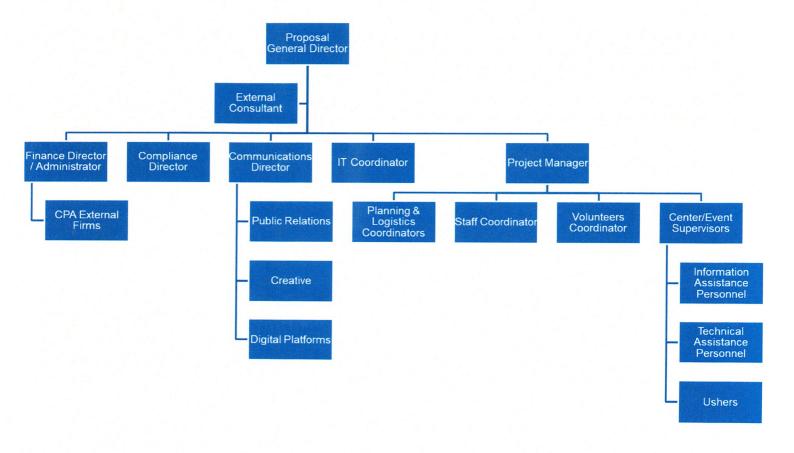
Vendor's Involvement: When the COVID-19 vaccine became available in Puerto Rico, VOCES immediately activated a coalition model, collaborating with various partners to vaccinate as many people as possible. Initial vaccination efforts targeted first responders, healthcare workers, and older adults. As vaccination expanded, government policies were enacted to manage the process. However, as demand decreases, VOCES adapted by intensifying promotion strategies for fixed vaccination centers, leading to a significant increase in vaccinations in strategic locations. The project prioritized areas of need and accessibility, following recommendations from the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP). To reach underserved populations, alternate methods such as community mobilization, non-traditional hours, and home visits were implemented. Throughout the project, we remained active in educating and promoting access to our events while providing support to other vaccination centers. We continued our educational campaign to address the most common concerns of patients who still have reservations about getting

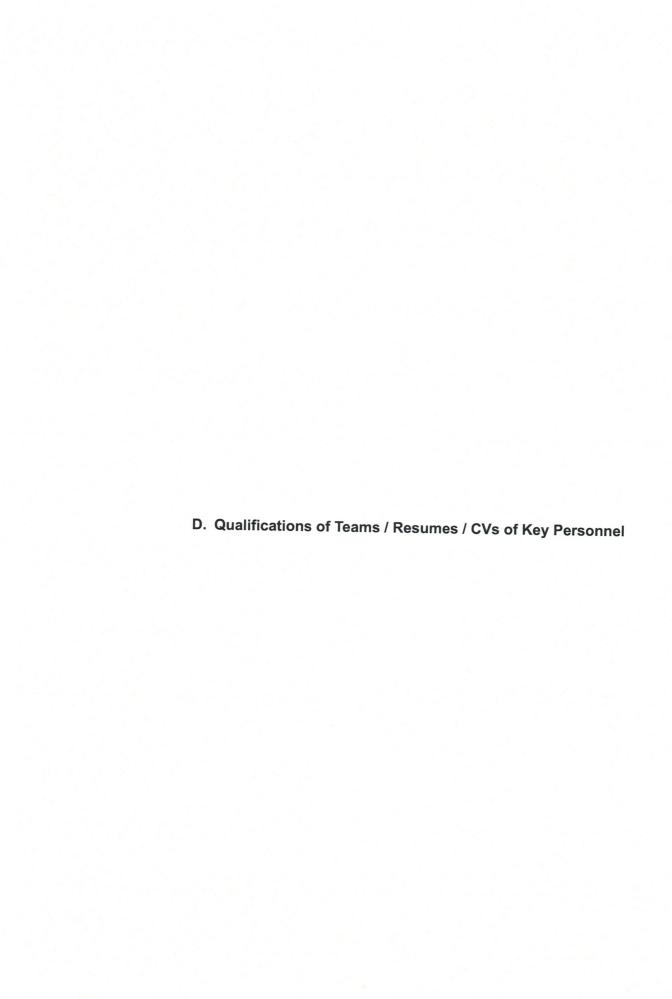
vaccinated or have questions about the primary series and booster shots. This effort contributed to over \$3.3 million in free education and advertising through TV, radio, press, articles, supplements, and the distribution of educational materials.

Project Benefits: During the COVID-19 vaccination campaign in Puerto Rico, VOCES achieved significant milestones, including the administration of 835,566 vaccine doses, the organization of 11,714 vaccination events, and the dispatch of 35,142 vaccine fridges. Notably, VOCES coordinated and executed a historic One Shot event at the Puerto Rico Convention Center, where 10,000 doses were administered in a single day. The campaign reached and impacted 78 municipalities, contributing to reducing health disparities among vulnerable populations. The organization's commitment extended to training and certification programs, including the certification of 1,600 participants as "Vaccination Promoters" and 13,875 healthcare professionals in the Management and Administration of the COVID-19 vaccine. A robust network of 17 fixed vaccination centers, two pediatric centers, and 17 temporary centers in collaboration with municipalities ensured accessible healthcare services. Overall, VOCES played a pivotal role in Puerto Rico's vaccination efforts, emphasizing education, accessibility, and community engagement.

She is an advocate for coalition work models, patient rights, and health access. She possesses communication and leadership skills, with a focus on results and strategic goals. She is characterized by determination, consistency, and advocacy for patients' rights to access and coverage of health services.

In 2013, she founded the VOCES Vaccination Coalition of Puerto Rico, which was later renamed the VOCES Immunization and Health Promotion Coalition of Puerto Rico. The organization's mission is to educate the general population about the importance of vaccination, improve access to necessary vaccines, and advocate for public policy updates on vaccination issues, prevention of vaccine-preventable diseases, and health promotion.

Lilliam has led the development of an educational platform with the creation of the Immunization and Health Promotion Congress, known as IMCO. This event is held annually with participation from over 1,200 professionals specializing in vaccination and public health emergency management. She also created the VOCES Awards to recognize the work of vaccination heroes.

In 2017, I led with VOCES, the mitigation of the crisis created by Hurricane Maria, maintaining the vaccination system in Puerto Rico, even without power, when more than 80% of the vaccines in P.R. were lost due to lack of energy. We managed to prevent a public health crisis, guarantee and offer services to communities by administering more than 88,000 doses of influenza, tetanus and pneumonia vaccines throughout the 78 municipalities, achieving a donation valued at more than 4 million dollars in vaccines for P.R. In a crisis where the biggest challenge was communication, through her leadership and good communication skills all the vaccination stakeholders in P.R. were activated to prevent an influenza epidemic, cases of tetanus and hepatitis A and B.

In 2018, VOCES received recognitions from various organizations for the actions led by Lilliam after Hurricane Maria. 1. RFP QUICK FACTS SHEET

1.1 Summary of the RFP

The Puerto Rico Medicaid Program (the Program) is soliciting assistance from interested entities in the recertification process of all Medicaid beneficiaries. The Federal Government has imposed a deadline of March 30, 2024, to complete this task. To meet this deadline, the Program is soliciting interested entities with experience in the development of education campaigns, reach out and assist in renewal processes to accomplish the goal of recertifying all beneficiaries.

Through this invitation, the Program is welcoming interested entities to propose and implement different strategies that would vigorously promote an effective participation of beneficiaries in their process of recertification.

2. Overview

2.1 Background

PRDoH is responsible for most of Puerto Rico's health and social service programs and services, including the Puerto Rico Medicaid Program (PRMP), the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), public health services and public hospitals. PRDoH is also the single state agency for the Medicaid program, in conjunction with a cooperative agreement with Administración de Seguros de Salud (ASES) which implements and administers the island-wide health insurance system.

States must complete renewals and other eligibility actions within 14 months after the beginning of the unwinding period that started on April 2023. States are allowed to determine how to prioritize their unwinding plans based on the state's needs. PRMP is ensuring everyone has access to quality healthcare coverage and one of the ways we are doing it is by spreading the word about the Medicaid renewal process.

2.2 Purposes

The main purpose of the RFP is to select a vendor with experience in the development, implementation and execution of strategies to help with beneficiary outreach and assisting Medicaid in the renewal process to accomplish the goal of recertifying all beneficiaries. PRMP is looking for vendors with interest in exploring innovative or out of the box strategies that go beyond standard approaches. Execution of strategies shall contemplate providing necessary personnel, materials, and/or equipment, when applicable.

Through the Medicaid renewal process, PRMP is committed to ensure that beneficiaries have the information and support they need to renew their benefits and that everyone eligible for Medicaid is covered.



3. Project Requirements

3.1 Scope of Work

PRDoH is seeking to contract with an organization with proven expertise in educational campaigns to support Puerto Rico Medicaid Program through the recertification process. The suggested services may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Develop, implement, and execute strategies to reach Medicaid beneficiaries for them to complete the recertification process.
- Orientation centers.
- Outdoor/indoor activities for orientation and assistance.
- Personal assistance to help the Medicaid beneficiaries through the renewal process.

3.2 Vendor's Minimum Qualifications and Experience

Vendors shall provide **information regarding the firm/organization** so PRDoH can evaluate the vendor's ability to provide the services requested herein. At its discretion, PRDoH may require vendors to provide additional information and clarify information.

To be considered for award, a vendor must provide evidence of their experience, including:

- Description of the firm/organization and/or personnel assembled to complete the project.
- Submit at least two (2) project descriptions where similar services were rendered.
- Demonstrate experience working with tight timelines.
- Provide evidence of compliance with all requirements by law to operate in Puerto Rico and contract with Puerto Rico Government.
 - o Prior to the vendor submission of its proposal, the vendor must be registered with the "Registro Único de Proveedores de Servicios Profesionales" (RUP) from the Puerto Rico General Services Administration (ASG) and with the Puerto Rico Treasury Department (Hacienda) for the collection of sales and use tax (IVU) as a provider (if applicable) in the Sistema Unificado de Rentas

The PRMP shall not award a contract, unless the vendor provides proof of such registration or provides documentation from the Puerto Rico Treasury Department that the vendor is exempt from this registration requirement in the SURI system. 3.2.1 Qualifications and Experience of Key Personnel

Vendors shall submit resumes for proposed Key Personnel to demonstrate evidence of relevant qualifications and experience necessary according to the scope of this RFP. Some personnel should be fully bilingual so they can communicate effectively and without delay.

3.2.1.1 Staff Qualifications

The Contractor shall warrant that all persons assigned shall be employees of the Contractor (or specified Subcontractor) and shall be fully qualified to perform the work required. The Contractor shall include a similar provision in any contract with any Subcontractor selected to perform work under this contract. Failure of the Contractor to provide qualified staffing at the level required by the contract specifications may result in termination of this contract or damages.

3.2.1.2 Subcontractors

The Contractor shall be the primary vendor for the contract. PRDoH will not subcontract any work under the contract to any other firm and will not deal with any subcontractors. The Contractor is solely responsible for all actions and work performed by its subcontractors. All terms, conditions, and requirements of the contract shall apply without qualification to any services performed or goods provided by any subcontractor.



3.2.2 Ownership

PRDoH shall own all data, forms, procedures, and work products developed or accumulated by the Contractor under this contract. The Contractor may not release any materials without the written approval of PRDoH.

3.2.3 Proof of Insurance

Upon request, the Contractor shall present an affidavit of Worker's Compensation, Public Liability, and Property Damage Insurance to the Division of Purchases.

3.2.4 Conflict of Interest

The Contractor shall not knowingly employ, during the period of this contract or any extensions to it, any professional personnel who are also in the employ of the Commonwealth and providing services involving this contract or services similar in nature to the scope of this contract to the Commonwealth. Furthermore, the Contractor shall not knowingly employ, during the period of this contract or any extensions to it, any Commonwealth employee who has participated in the making of this contract until at least two years after his/her termination of employment with the State.

3.3 Award according to PRMP best value

The Buena Pro will be awarded in favor of the proposal that represents the best value for PRDoH and the government of Puerto Rico. PRDoH may award the contract to more than one vendor, based on the specific services rendered. Cost, although it is a core factor, is not decisive to award the good pro in favor of a participant.

3.4 Reference Checks

Please see sections eight (8) and nine (9), and Attachments B and C for more information.

3.5 Criteria

Proposals that comply with all requirements will be evaluated by a PRDoH appointed panel, according to a weight/score method. As part of its analysis, PRMP will give its highest consideration to the qualifications/experience of the proponent and to its proposal. The assigned weight for both criteria will be 4. For cost, the assigned weight will be 2. The evaluation



committee will grant a score from 1 through 5 (1 being the lowest; 5 being the highest) according to their evaluation.

To be evaluated, proposals must be:

- Received by the due date/time.
- Meet proposal style requirements.
- Follow proposal format.
- Be complete and have all supporting documents required.



4. Proposal Response Instructions

4.1 Proposal Format

5. Administrative and Judicial Review Process

Any person or party adversely affected or aggrieved by an award made regarding this Request for Proposal proceeding may, according to 3 L.P.R.A. § 9659, file a motion for reconsideration with the Puerto Rico Department of Health (PRDoH), within a term of ten (10) days from the date of the notification of the award. The-PRDoH must consider the motion for reconsideration within ten (10) business days of being filed. If any determination is made in its consideration, the term to request the appeal for judicial review will begin from the date on which a copy of the notification of the decision of the PRDoH is filed on record, according to the case, resolving the motion for reconsideration. If the filing date of the copy of the notification of the decision is different from that of the deposit in the ordinary mail or the sending by electronic means of said notification, the term will be calculated from the date of the deposit in the ordinary mail or sending by electronic means, as appropriate. If the PRDoH fails to take any action in relation to the motion for reconsideration within ten (10) days of its filing, it shall be understood that the motion was denied outright, and the time to request judicial review shall start to run from said date.

If the PRDoH accepts the reconsideration request within the term provided, it must issue the reconsideration decision or resolution within thirty (30) days following the filing of the motion. for reconsideration. If the PRDoH accepts the motion for reconsideration but fails to take any action in relation to the motion within thirty (30) days of its filing, it will lose its jurisdiction and the term to request the judicial review will begin from the expiration of said term of thirty (30) days. The Department of Health may extend said term only once, for an additional period of fifteen (15) days.

Any person or party adversely affected by a final reconsideration decision or resolution may file a petition for review with the Puerto Rico Court of Appeals within a term of twenty (20) business days of such final decision or determination being filed. See 3 L.P.R.A § 9672.

The mere presentation of a motion for reconsideration does not have the effect of preventing the PRMP from continuing with the procurement process intended within this Request for Proposal.

Challenges must be submitted using the form and according to the instructions in <u>Attachment D:</u> <u>Terms for Filing a Review</u> of this RFP and shall be considered waived and invalid if the objection has not been submitted as instructed in <u>Attachment D</u>.
